

BALANCED REFORM

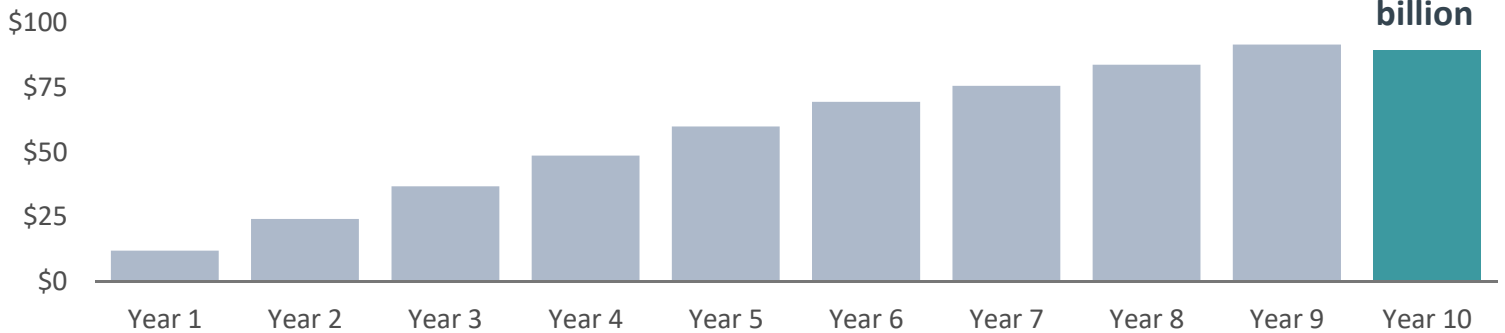
Texas

A balanced approach to immigration reform emphasizes strong border security and employment verification, while also streamlining and expanding the existing high-skilled (H-1B), low-skilled (H-2A) and green card visa programs and establishing a new H-2C category to help businesses expand. It promises to grow Texas' economy, create nearly one million new jobs and increase the incomes of Texas households.

Projected Change in GDP (USD Billions)

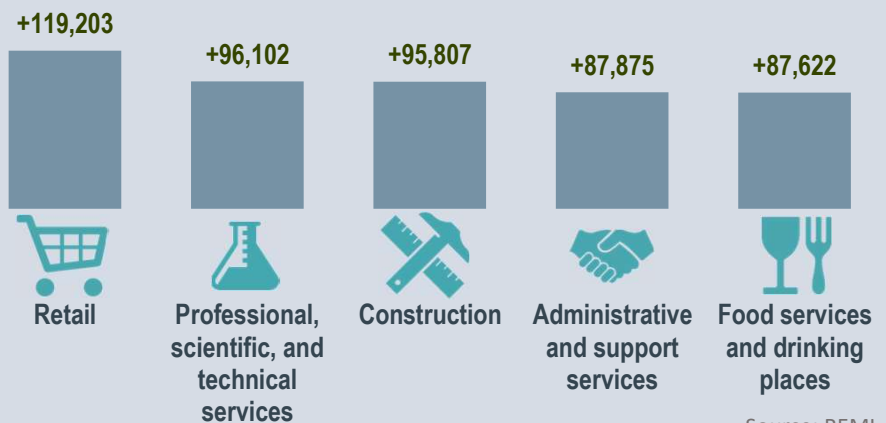

ENFORCEMENT ONLY

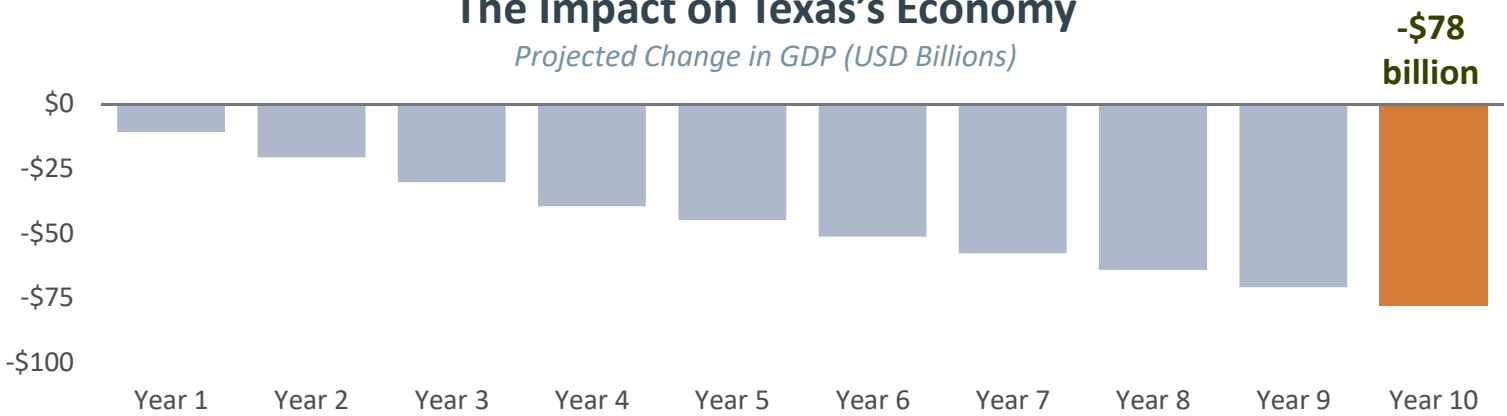
Texas

An enforcement-only approach to immigration reform centers on aggressive border security measures and the removal of most undocumented residents. Such an approach would cost Texas tens of billions in gross domestic product (GDP), eliminate hundreds of thousands of jobs statewide and lower the incomes of Texas households.

Projected Change in GDP (USD Billions)

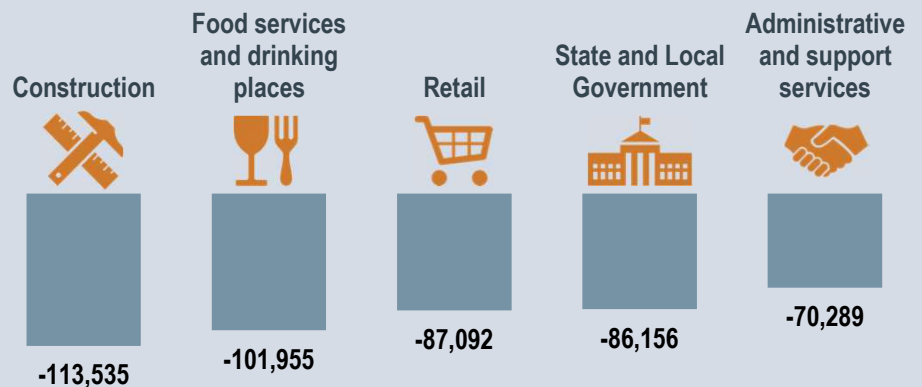
